Course Coverage	Topics include theory of general linear model and generalized linear models such as ran- dom vectors, multivariate normal distribution, distributions of quadratic forms, general linear models for normal data, extension to generalized linear models for non-normal data such as binary, polytomous and count data; point and interval estimation; and hypothesis testing.
Learning outcomes	 Derive distributions for vectors of random variables. Articulate key concepts in estimation theory for general and generalized linear models. Derive a suitable inference procedure for the given data under appropriate model assumptions.
